
### Michelle Reader

- She sometimes uses mechanical elements, such as pieces of toys or clocks.


### Jill Townsley

## Key Vocabulary

- figurative** When artwork looks like a real-life object.
- installation** An art installation is a 3-Dimensional structure that has been created and constructed where it is being exhibited.
- materials** Materials are what are used to create a piece of artwork such as paint, glue, spoons.
- mechanical** Mechanical means relating to machines and engines and the way they work
- pyramid** A pyramid is a shape, object, or pile of things with a flat base and sloping triangular sides that meet at a point.
- recycled** If you recycle things that have already been used, such as bottles or sheets of paper, you process them so that they can be used again.
- sculpture** A sculpture is a work of art that is produced by carving or shaping stone, wood, clay, or other materials.
- shape** A shape is a space enclosed by an outline, for example a circle, a square, or a triangle.
- statue** A statue is a large sculpture of a person or an animal, made of stone or metal.
